

I was born in Amarillo, Texas, in 1937, and lived in Texas until I married Lyle "Abe" Abrahamson, who was a Phillips Petroleum Company engineer, in 1964. I met Abe while I was also working for Phillips in Borger, TX. We lived briefly in Japan, where he was working on a Phillips licensing job. We arrived in Bartlesville in January 1965, where we lived until June 1980. For the next four years we were lucky enough to live in Stavanger, Norway, after which we returned to Bartlesville.

Along the way, I taught at school for a couple of years. While I greatly admire (and somewhat envy) those who successfully teach for many years, I decided that teaching was not my talent. And while I was trying to decide what to do with the rest of my life, I started volunteering at Washington County SPCA. That was the year of 1974 and from that time forward, my life has belonged to the movement of protecting animals from unnecessary suffering. In that regard, I have worn many hats and done many things, on the local, state and national levels, mostly regarding humane legislation. Thus sharing information has always been my focal point. You may have seen letters I have written to the EE and Tulsa World about various aspects of animal protection. You may have seen articles that I write for the WCSPCA newsletter from time to time.

I cherish my membership in the Women's Network and the friendship of other members. These friendships, both old and new, have been a sustaining comfort to me, especially following Abe's death in 2012.
